**Objectives:** To introduce students to the key ideas underlying responsible conduct in research and certify them to work on National Science Foundation (NSF) and National Institute of Health (NIH) grants as required by UNM and the US Federal Government.

**Certification or Recertification:** Attending all four classes and completion of both the group presentation and online training is required for certification or recertification. Recertification is required every 4-years. Registration for Physics 500 is NOT required for either certification or recertification.

**Schedule:**

November 7: Introduction; Advising and Mentoring; Treatment of Data; Mistakes and Negligence; Research Misconduct.

November 14: Responding to Violations of Professional Standards; Human Participants and Animal Subjects in Research; Laboratory Safety; Sharing of Research Results and Peer Review; Authorship and the Allocation of Credit; Intellectual Property.

November 21: Collaborative Research; Competing Interests, Commitments, and Values; The Researcher in Society; Group Presentations.

December 5: Group Presentations.

**Group Presentations:** The class will be divided into groups and each group will choose a topic, or topics, from the National Academies publication *On Being a Scientist: A Guide to Responsible Conduct in Research*. Outside class the group will develop *their own* case study focused on their topic(s). The group will have, depending upon the number of groups, approximately 20 minutes to present the case to the class and lead a discussion about the case and the ways it can be resolved. The use of handouts and other media such as video is encouraged. All members of the group are expected to participate significantly in the case preparation, presentation, and discussion. It is anticipated that at least two-hours of preparation will be required for each group presentation. This time serves as critical informal instruction required for RCR certification. Groups will make presentations during class on November 21<sup>st</sup> and December 5<sup>th</sup>.
